

# **Growing Aerangis Orchids**

**Aerangis**, abbreviated as **Aergs** in horticultural trade, is a <u>genus</u> of the <u>Orchid</u> family (Orchidaceae). The name of this genus has been derived from the Greek words 'aer' (air) and 'angos' (urn), referring to the form of the lip. It is the <u>type genus</u> of the subtribe <u>Aerangidinae</u>. Approximately 50 species in this genus are known mostly from tropical <u>Africa</u>, but also from the <u>Comoro Islands</u>, <u>Madagascar</u> and <u>Sri Lanka</u>.

Species are usually <u>epiphytic</u>, sometimes <u>lithophytic</u> small orchids, resembling <u>Vanda</u>s in appearance. Their large, waxy, star-shaped flowers are generally white, cream-colored or yellow. They show a long, nectar-filled spur, often longer than the flower itself. There is a single stem with many flowers on a long raceme. The <u>lip</u> is flat and resembles the <u>petals</u> and <u>sepals</u>. They give off an agreeable smell during the night. There are six to ten parallel-veined, fleshy, evergreen leaves.

These orchids are not often found in collections, even though they are rather easy to grow. Around 15 species are commonly available.

### Place

Put the Aerangis on a warm, light place where they are protected against direct sunlight. The leafs may not be burned by the sunlight.

# **Temperature**

Make sure that it's not over 30② in summer and let it cool down to around 16,5② by night. In winter, it's still fine to let it cool down to around 12②.

# Humidity

We advise a humidity between 55% and 80%. This differs per species within the gender and depends on the size of the plant. Besides that, the humidity can be lower during winter than during summer.



# Water

**Tied up:** Mist the Aerangis daily during summer. You can cut back to 2/3 times a week during winter.

**In a pot:** In summer it's best to let the Aerangis dry a bit before watering it again. The soil can be soaked thoroughly. In winter, the Aerangis can be misted lightly.

# Fertilizer

**Tied up:** In spring and in summer we recommend to fertilize the Aerangis lightly once a In winter, it's best to do this once a two weeks so that the Aerangis keeps its activity.

**In a pot:** During winter, when the Aerangis is in a state of growth, fertilize lightly once a two weeks.

For both types (tied up and in a pot) we advise to use half of what's on the packaging. With the fertilizer, new leaves can grow better and the size of the leaves will be maintained better.

# Repotting

Preferably every year in January in seedling potting soil or potting soil (sphagnum).

This is important, because the soil will start the salification process. That's because of the fertilizer. The fertilizer is important too, because there won't be enough sunlight for the Aerangis. Normally, the sunlight provides the Aerangis with sugars that are essential to create the growth of flower branches. Therefore it's harder for the Aerangis to start blooming without the fertilizer.
